Internet**

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as internet access gets cheaper and more widespread, and computing power becomes more powerful, the sites and services of the web are capable of being realized by new kinds of people: those who do not have technical training, who never had access to a personal computer of their own, and who had never so much as heard of a search engine or a browser. pervasive low-cost access to the internet is leading to the creation of a parallel realm of digital literacy, and it is the means by which the most people are now able to accomplish more things than ever before. new kinds of applications are being created at mind-boggling rates by people who have never had any access to technology at all before, and these applications are in turn supporting technology-insecure populations like never before. for instance, in recent years i have heard recorded examples of common speech queries like: "can you speak athi?" (ask about your ability to speak in sign language), "i have a music video", "i want to make a video about philosophy", and even "how are we doing on the gender inequality?" the new mode of digital inquiry is already supporting a parallel and massively parallel community of research that will certainly have significant implications for how scientists relate to each other. in the past, the distribution of information about results was piecemeal, but now it becomes possible for the distributed community to rapidly share information about previously isolated cases. the internet is inherently a linear medium, constrained by the way that data is transmitted across the network. while the majority of digital communications is still reliant on the tcp/ip protocol to move information across the web, the entire internet is increasingly constrained by the lack of flexibility in the protocol to allow the simultaneous and complementary uploading and downloading of large volumes of information in a timely fashion. a virtual lobby for digital culture has become the place that people congregate to be filled up, to get to know each other, to exchange knowledge, to share gossip, to share personal information, and to share the stuff of life. the flow is to happen concurrently, every-time. not only is the accumulation of knowledge public, it is likely to become further democratized than in the past, and the effects may be unprecedented. the internet allows for the diffusion of information as part of its very existence. though the source of that information is the source of its informational content.

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i won't have time to think about this more deeply until i get back to my office. all i can say is that i'm thinking about the concept of "data" more than usual. for the first time i'm wondering if i've been using the word in a way that sounds weird because it doesn't really correspond to the way people (including, i don't know, your favorite statistician) really think about data. the word "data" doesn't mean the same thing to me as it does to the people in our department. i'm going to have to stop typing for a few minutes and think about what i'm doing in a more cognitively intentional

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way, since i know how crazy this sounds. i'm going to try to make some new experiments. i'm going to go into the field to see what's going on with the new paradigm. maybe i'll have some luck with my hypothesis. maybe i won't. here is my first experiment: i will listen very carefully to what's being said on the phone. i'll record it and transcribe it. if i had a competent summer student from the physics department who was curious about what it's like to have a career as an ideas person, i'd teach her how to use the turing archive's university of illinois. hello, internet. the name of my blog is my curious mind. this is where i am going to try to explain some of what's happening in my thinking. i am not always going to succeed in communicating it. i'm not sure if i will succeed at all. i try to think straight about my thoughts, but the results are erratic and unpredictable. the reason i write is that i think people might be reading and need a clue as to what's really going on. hopefully this blog is a source of insight. 5ec8ef588b

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
